

Lee Isaac Morris

Services for Lee Isaac Morris, 88, of Logansport, will be held at 11:30 a.m. Monday at First United Methodist Church.

Lee went to be with the Lord at 3:04 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 25, 2005, in Memorial Hospital.

Born Sept. 11, 1916, in Cass County, he was the son of Isaac LeRoy and Jennie Edith Reeser Morris. He was married to Marjorie E. Taylor on May 22, 1938, in Logansport, and the couple celebrated their 67th wedding anniversary May 22, 2005. She survives.

Lee joined the Logansport Police Department on July 15, 1943, where he served as a patrolman for six years and detective for six years. He was chief of police from 1956 until 1964, and Mount Hope cemetery sexton from 1968 to 1980.

A member of First United Methodist Church, Lee formerly belonged to Third Street United Methodist, where he was a member for 60 years, serving as head usher for 40 years, teaching Sunday school and participating on several church boards.

He was very active in the Democratic Party, and was a former precinct committeeman.

Lee was a devoted husband, father and grandfather who enjoyed spending time with his family and wintering in Florida.

Including his wife, other survivors are: two daughters, Connie Lee Graf, and her husband, Dick, and Nancy Linn Beachler and her husband, John, all of Logansport; one granddaughter, Beth Brown, and her husband, Nathan, Evansville; three grandsons, David Lee Beachler, and his wife, Elizabeth, Grand Rapids, Mich., Kevin Graf, and his wife, Stephanie, Monroe, Ohio, and Mark Graf, and his wife, Beverly, Logansport; four great-grandchildren, Tyler Graf, Kristen Graf, Cameron Graf and Wyatt Brown; and several nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by five sisters, Dorothy Leffert, Maxine Burns, Betty Sims, Patty Peterson and Mary Ann Morris; and three brothers, Bert Morris, George Morris and Paul Morris.

The Rev. Bill Shannon will officiate at the services. Burial will be in Mount Hope Cemetery, Logansport.
