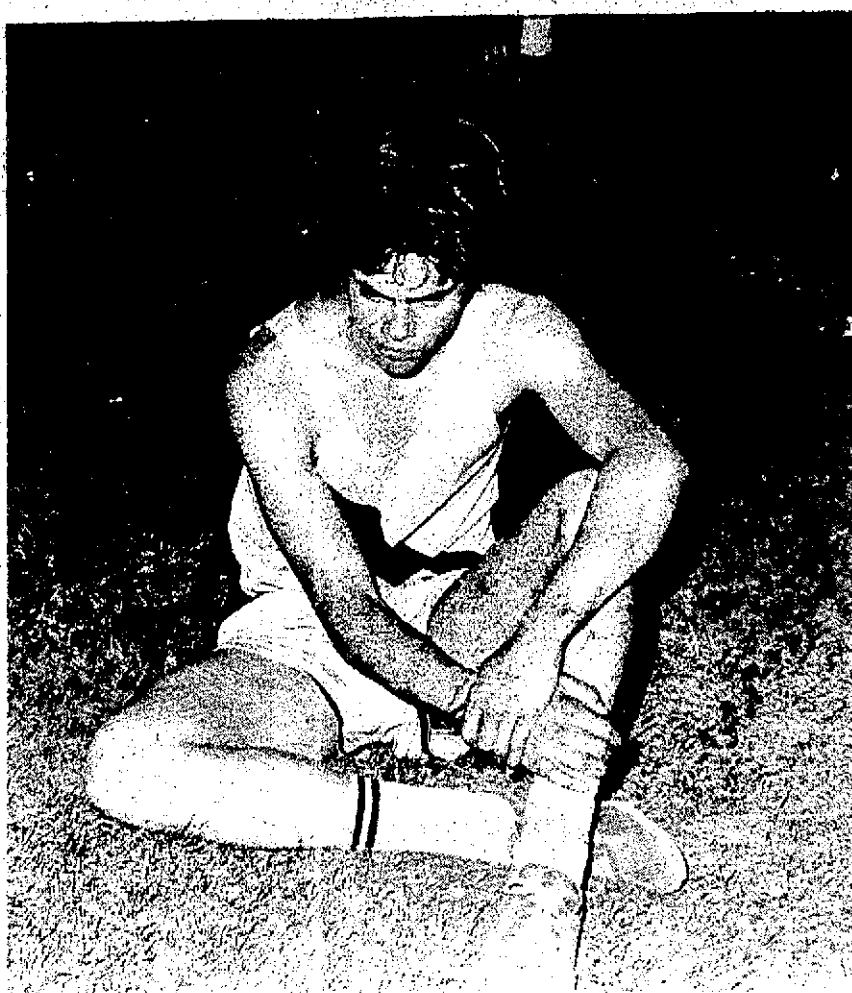

Bayh To Decide In 'Near Future'

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UPI) — Calling Senate life "fulfilling" and saying he would not seek the presidency just as an "ego trip," Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Indiana, said here Monday he will decide in the "near future" whether to run for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1976.

"If I do decide to run, I will probably enter the Ohio primary next June," Bayh said in a speech at the Ohio State University College of Pharmacy.

In his third Senate term, Bayh, 47, said he is still trying to determine whether to run for his party's nomination next year.

"Due to new federal law that provides matching funds for primary campaigns of presidential candidates," said

Bayh, "I will have to make a determination in the near future. My decision will be based on whether enough individuals feel I have more to offer than the other Democratic presidential prospects."

Wise said Starke, who was northbound on U.S. 35 in his 1973 patrol car, went through a red light at the Pearl Street intersection. The deputy's car was struck by a 1973 auto which was westbound on Pearl Street.

Driver of the second auto was Chester Chrzan, 40, Rt. 3, Winamac, who complained of pain in the left arm afterwards. Neither Chrzan nor Starke required hospitalization.

The impact of the two autos caused each to spin around and a utility pole on the northwest corner of the intersection was broken off. Wise estimated damage to both autos at \$1,800.
